

Queensland Neighbourhood Centres Strategy for Disaster Resilience



A Collaborative Process of Strategy Development

- Scoping review of literature on the role of Neighbourhood Centres in monsoons.
- > Through phone and online survey, participants shared their knowledge and experience of supporting monsoon-affected communities.

> Regular online sessions, including a presentation of the thematic findings from phone conversations and survey, facilitated the process of developing, reviewing, and refining the six strategic priorities.

Neighbourhood Centres reviewed the working drafts of the Strategy; feedback was implemented into the finalised Strategy









Key Findings


Neighbourhood Centres


- Are often the first and last point of contact for individuals affected by monsoons.
- Can adapt quickly to the needs of their local community; by tapping into the local resources through collaborations, and rearranging internal roles where staff resources are available.
- See that empowering individuals to prepare for monsoon and build a strong support network as a key step to enhancing their community's resilience.











Communicate the role and capacity of Neighbourhood Centre in supporting monsoon-affected communities.

Increase monsoon preparedness through having conversations and sharing locally relevant information with community members about the risks of and how to prepare for monsoons.

STRATEGIES



Raise awareness about the most- affected population during monsoons being the vulnerable individuals; and the value of Neighbourhood Centres being able to refer identified individual to some local Council's 'Vulnerable People Register'. Additionally, to build the resilience of the vulnerable population through strengthening their connection to a support network.



Continually identify opportunities to communicate and collaborate with local organisations, Local Disaster Management Group and local Council on supporting monsoon-affected communities; and for Neighbourhood Centres to be linked into their referral database.

Advocate for Neighbourhood Centres to be included in disaster planning by raising awareness with the Local Disaster Management Group and the Government about their capacity and available resources to support monsoon-affected communities.

Neighbourhood Centre Disaster Resilience Strategy Project

Neighbourhood Centres are playing a crucial role across the state in responding to natural disasters using community-led initiatives. The Queensland Families and Communities Association is developing a Queensland-wide Disaster Resilience Strategy with the Neighbourhood Centre sector by researching, analysing and using participatory methods to further develop and enhance this work. The Strategy will comprise of three distinct sub-strategies focused on drought, monsoon and bushfire. These strategies will be used as research and strategy frameworks for their respective regions while being aggregated into a Queensland-wide strategy for Neighbourhood Centres across the state.
